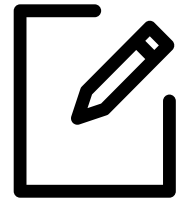


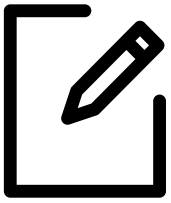

Grammar Quiz #1 Answers



Answer the following questions about grammar

1. Nouns are words that refer to people, places, things, or ideas; pronouns are used to replace nouns in a sentence.
2. To form possessive nouns, simply add an apostrophe and the letter "s" to a singular noun or an apostrophe after the final "s" of a plural noun.
3. An example of a collective noun is "group."
4. Subject pronouns are used as the subject of the sentence (I, we, you, he, she, it), while object pronouns (me, us, you, him, her, it) are used as the object of a verb or preposition in the sentence.
5. Countable nouns are those that can be counted by their number and can take on singular or plural forms; uncountable nouns cannot be counted and only exist in singular form.
6. The eight parts of speech are: Nouns, Pronouns, Verbs, Adjectives, Adverbs, Prepositions, Conjunctions, Interjections.
7. Gerunds are verb forms that end in "-ing" and function as nouns in a sentence; infinitives have an implied "to" before them and function as adverbs or adjectives.
8. Adverbs modify verbs by indicating manner (quickly) or frequency (often); they can also modify adjectives (+very) and other adverbs (+really).
